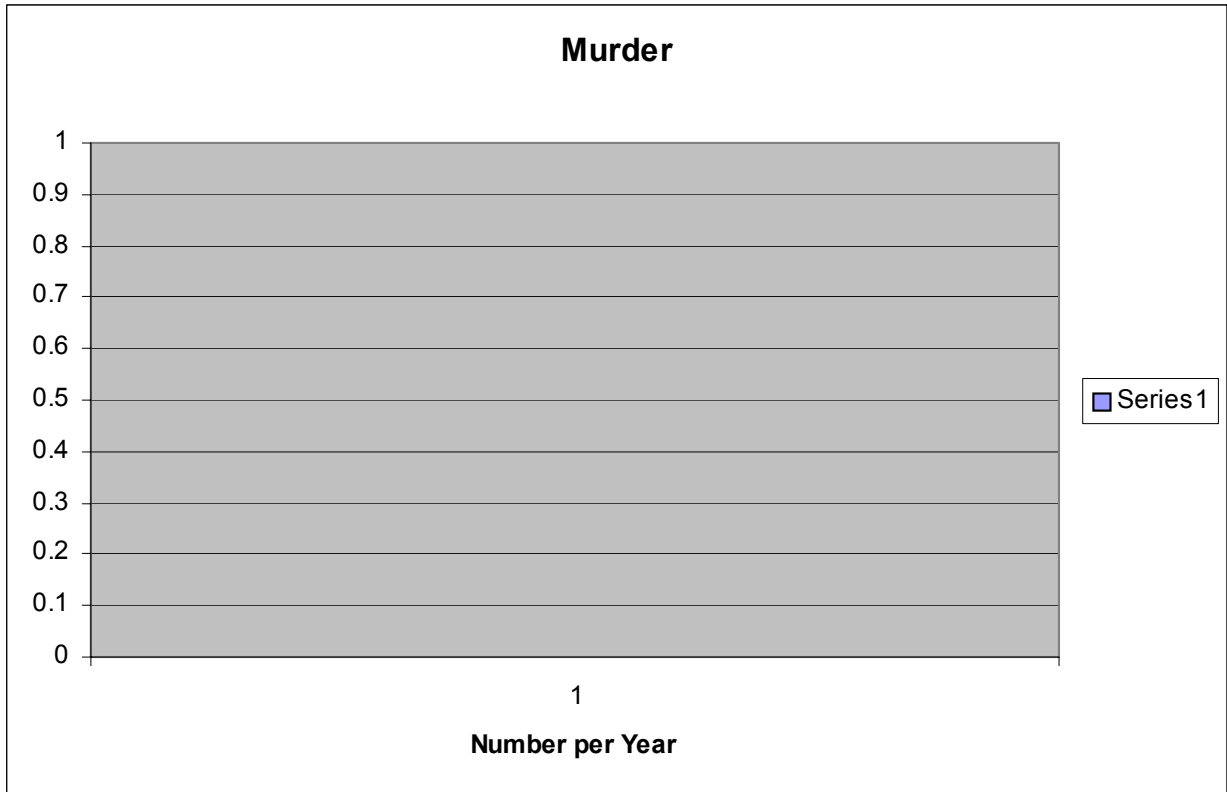

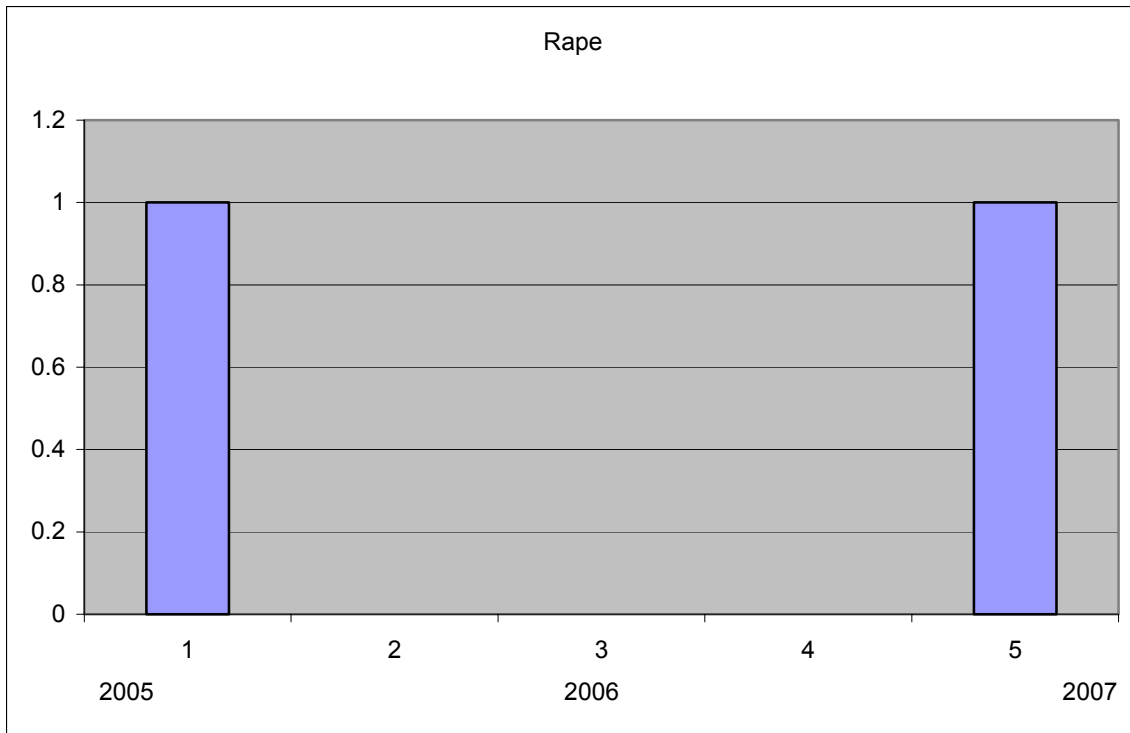
# FBI Reportable Statistics

## Murder



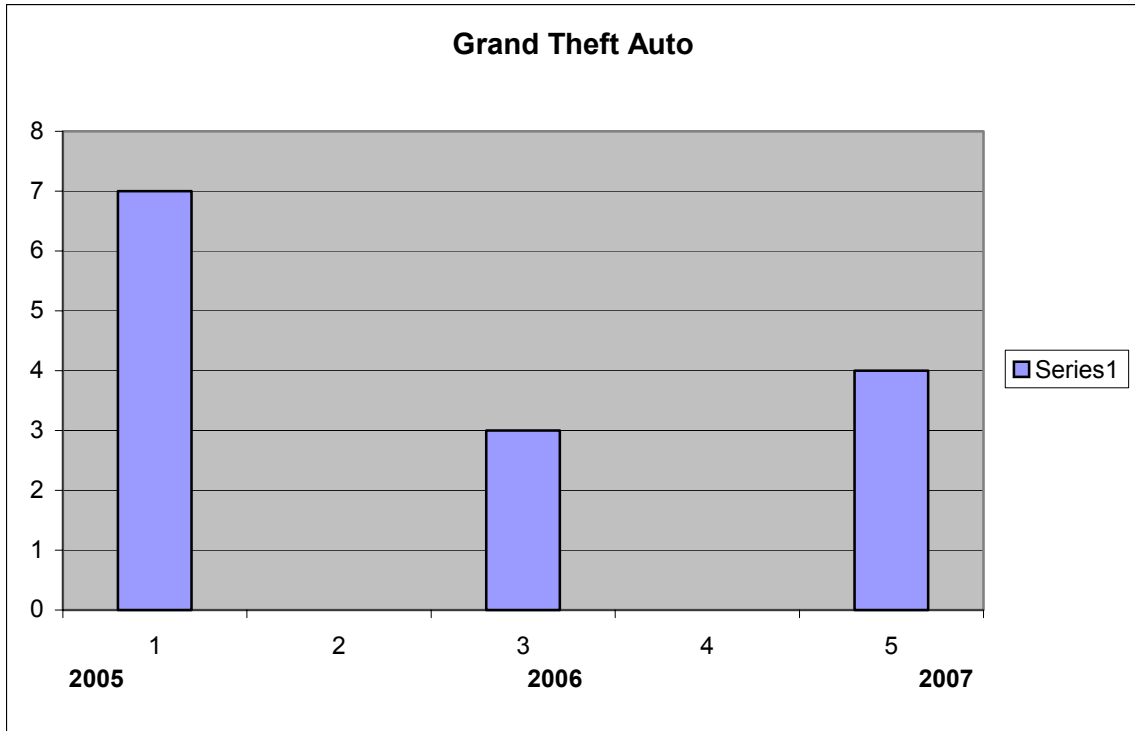
There were no Murders in 2007. The Department has not had any Murders/Homicides in the past three years.

# Rape



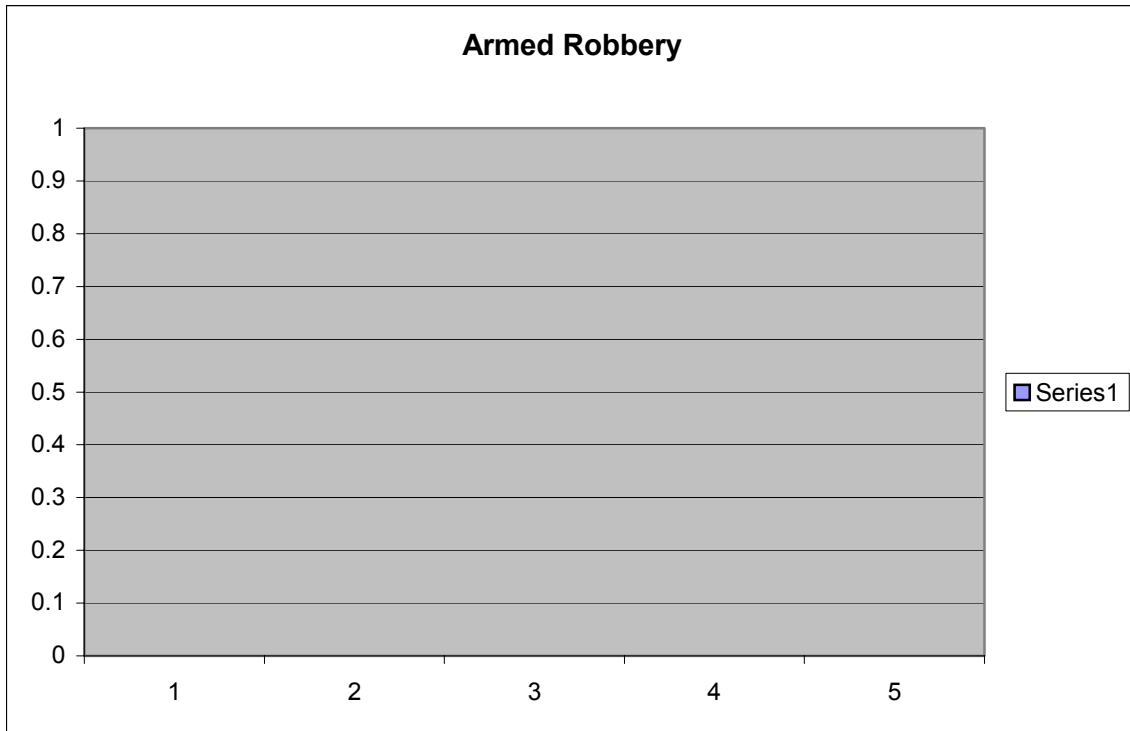
There was one Rape in 2007. This is an increase from 2006, but no increase in 2005.

## Grand Theft Auto



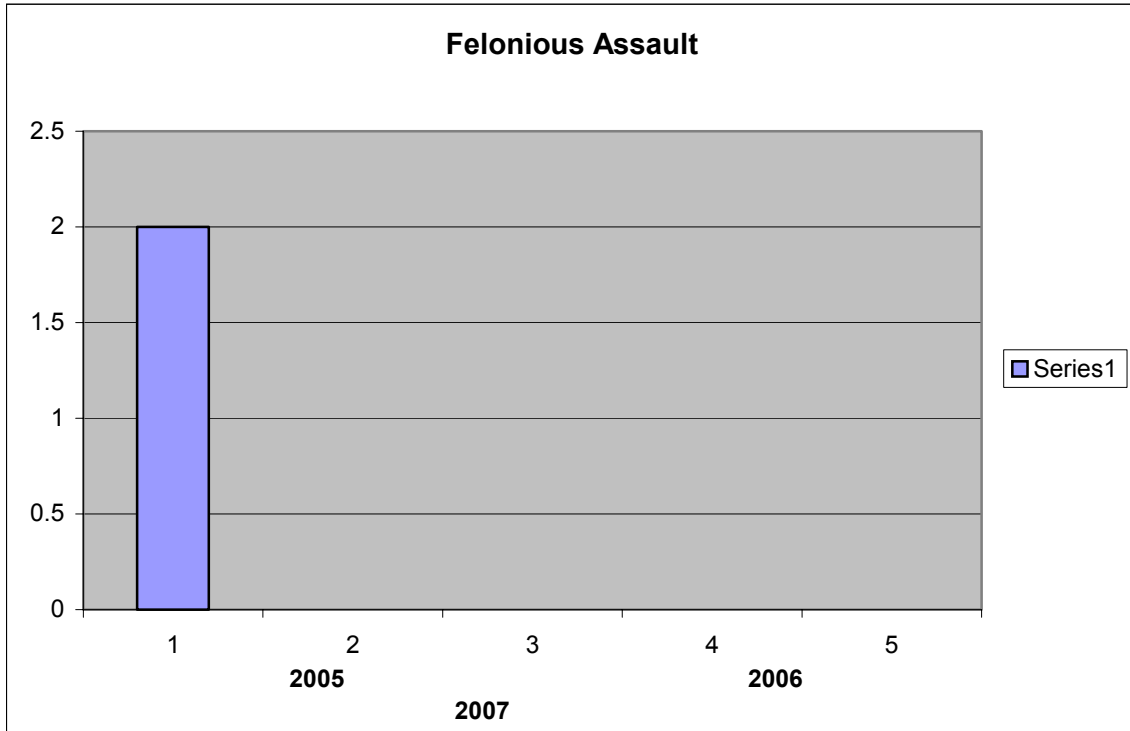
There was 4 Auto thefts in 2007, which is up one from 2006, but a decline from 2005

## Armed Robbery



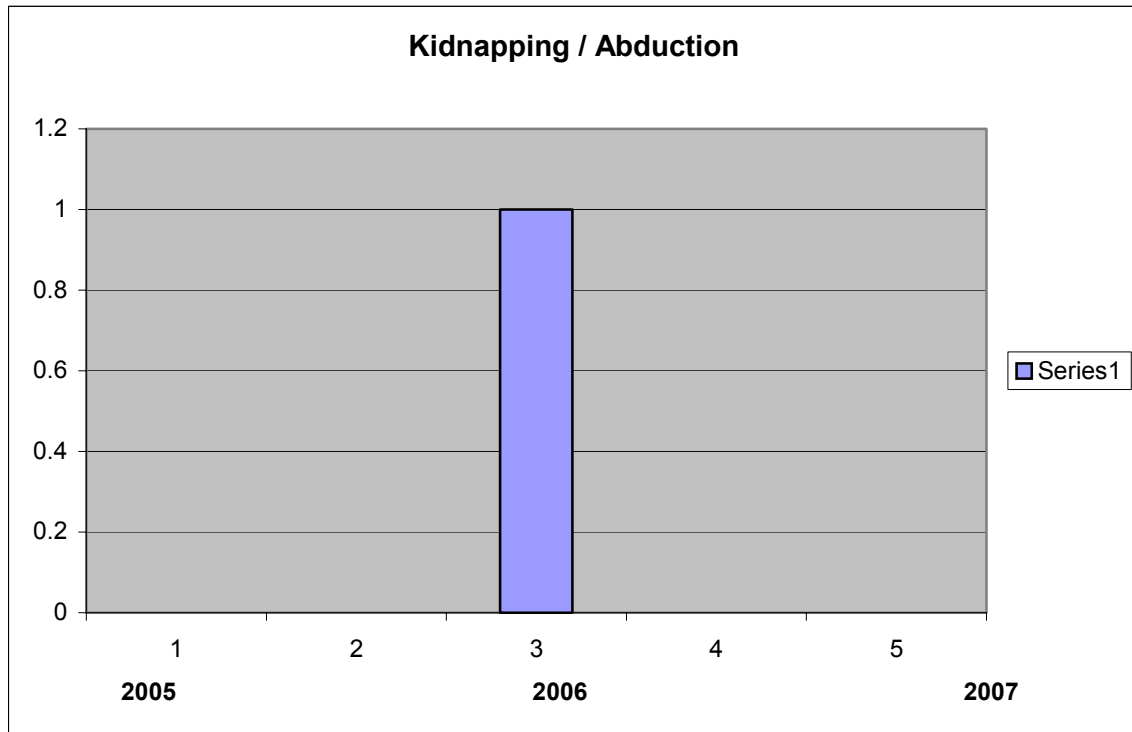
There has been no armed robbery's in the last three years.

## Felonious Assault



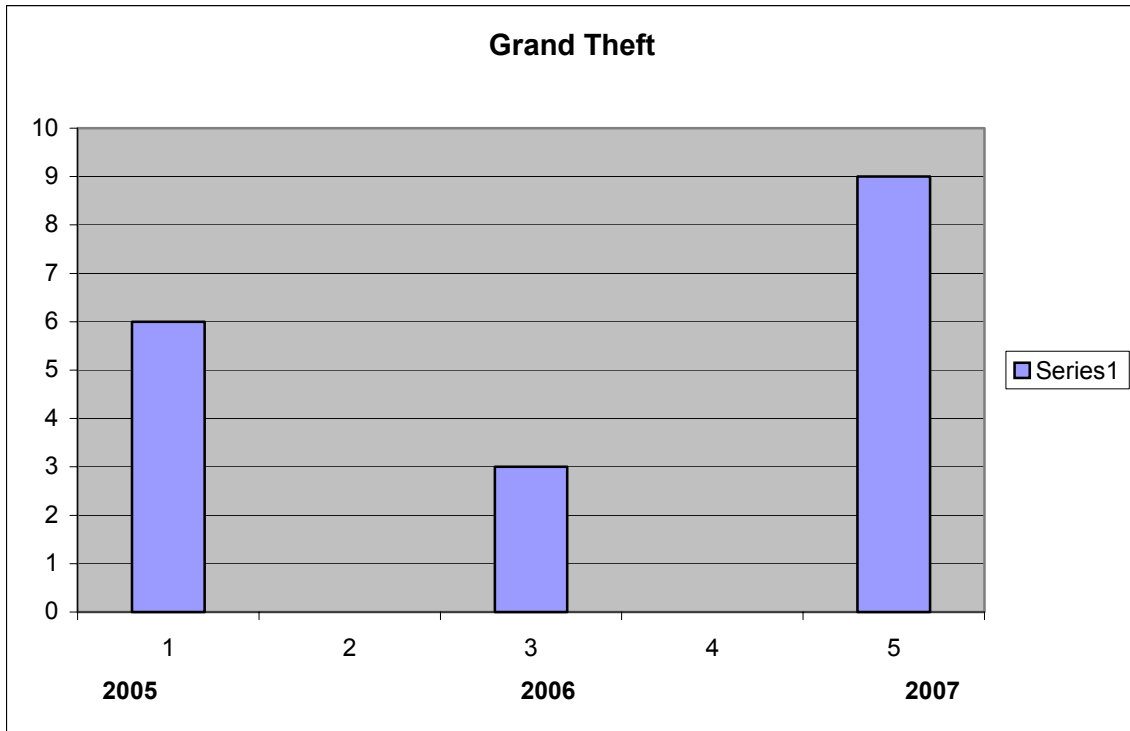
There was no Felonious Assaults in 2007. There were two cases in 2005, and none in 2006

There were no Kidnapping / abductions in 2007. There was one in 2006, and none in 2005.

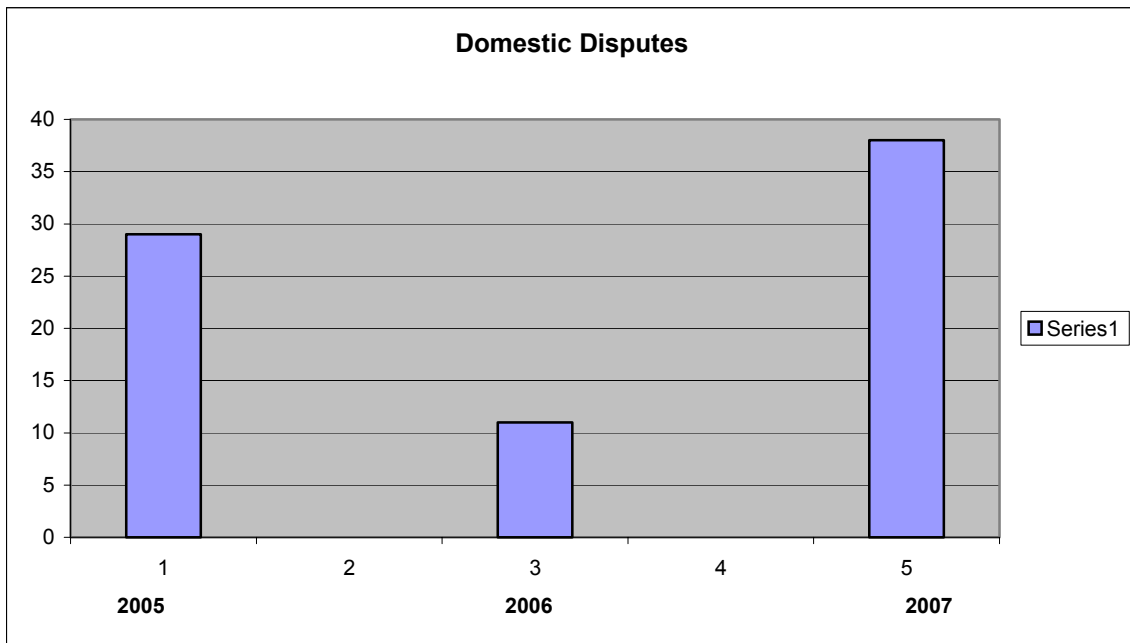
## Grand Theft



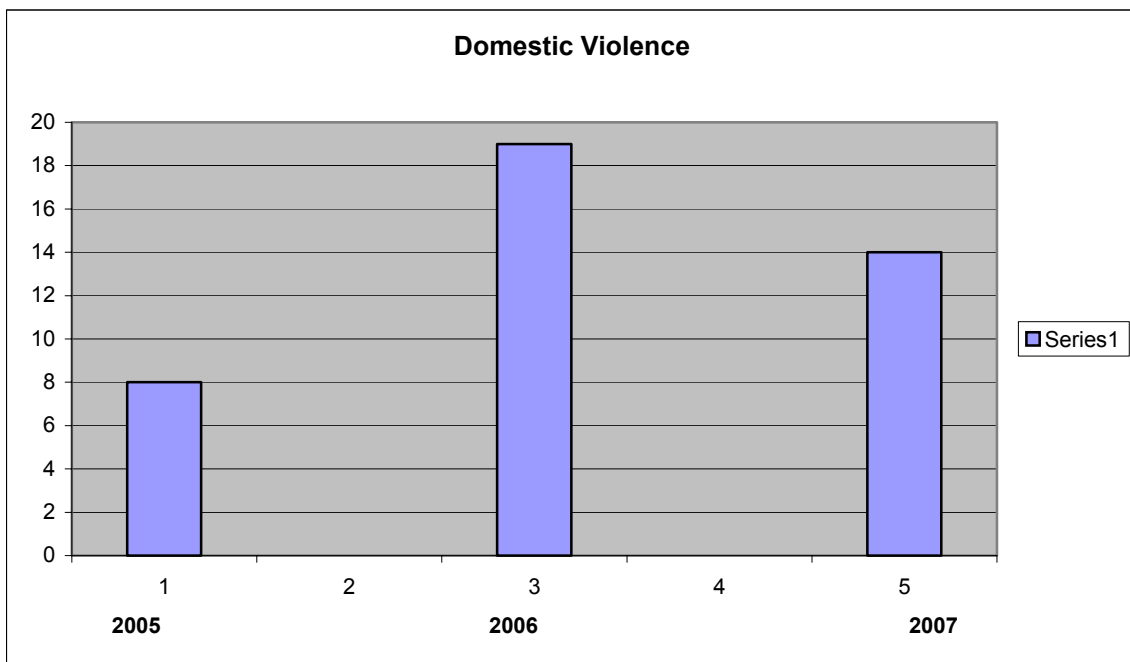
There were 9 Grand thefts in 2007, which is an increase from 2005 and 2006. This upward trend has been statistical proven driven by the economy.

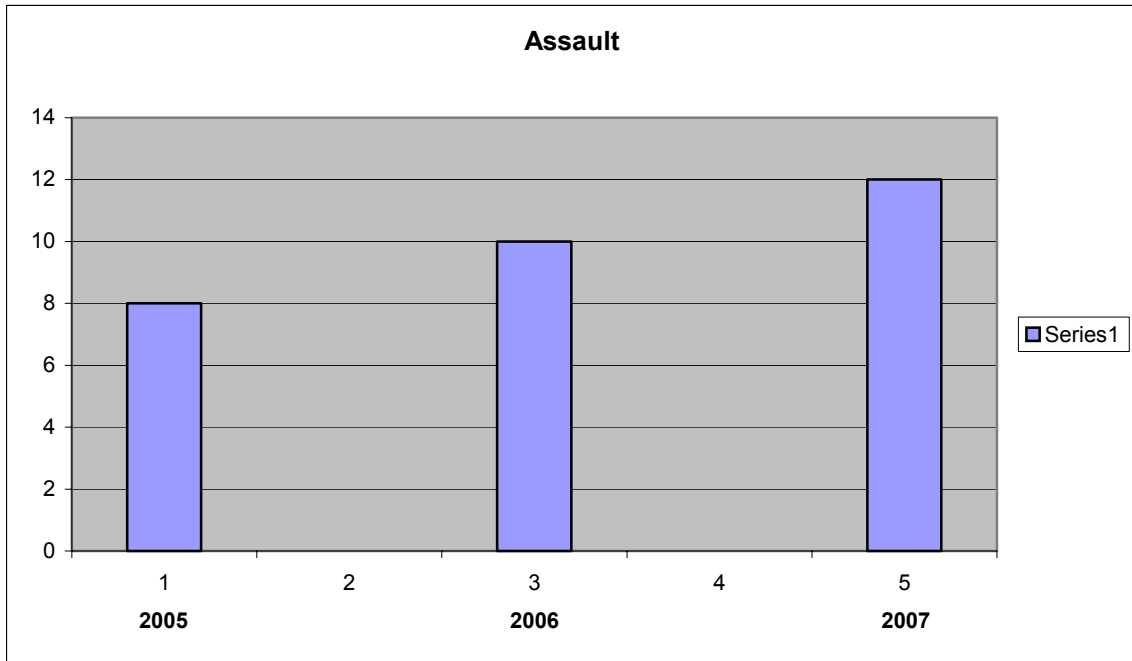

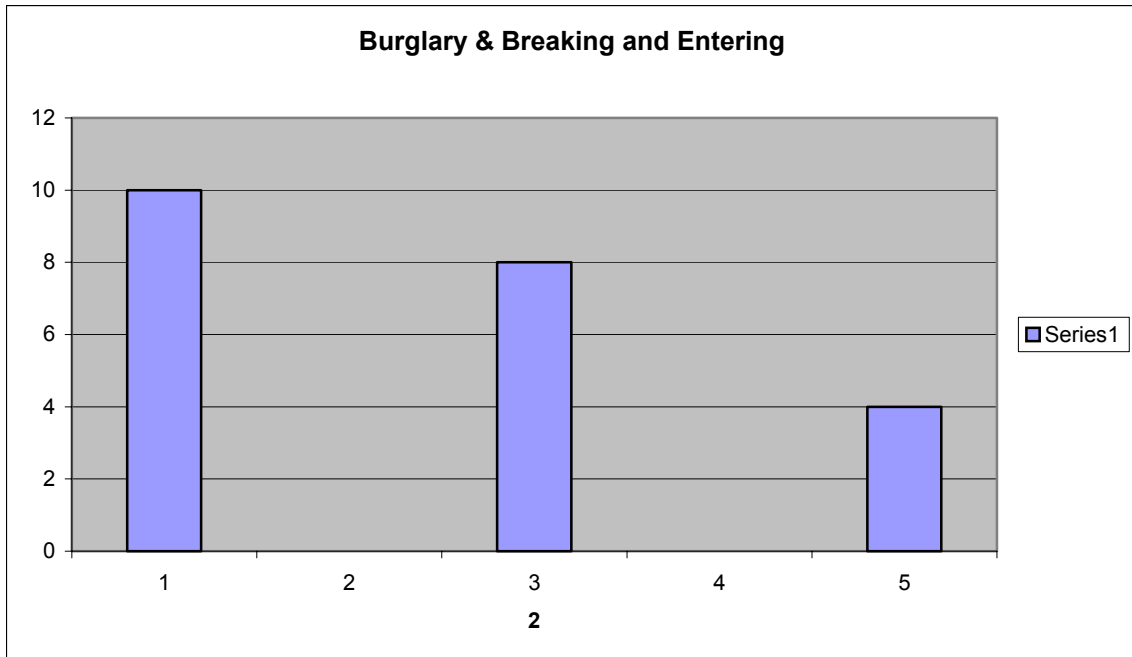
There is a marked in-crease in 2007



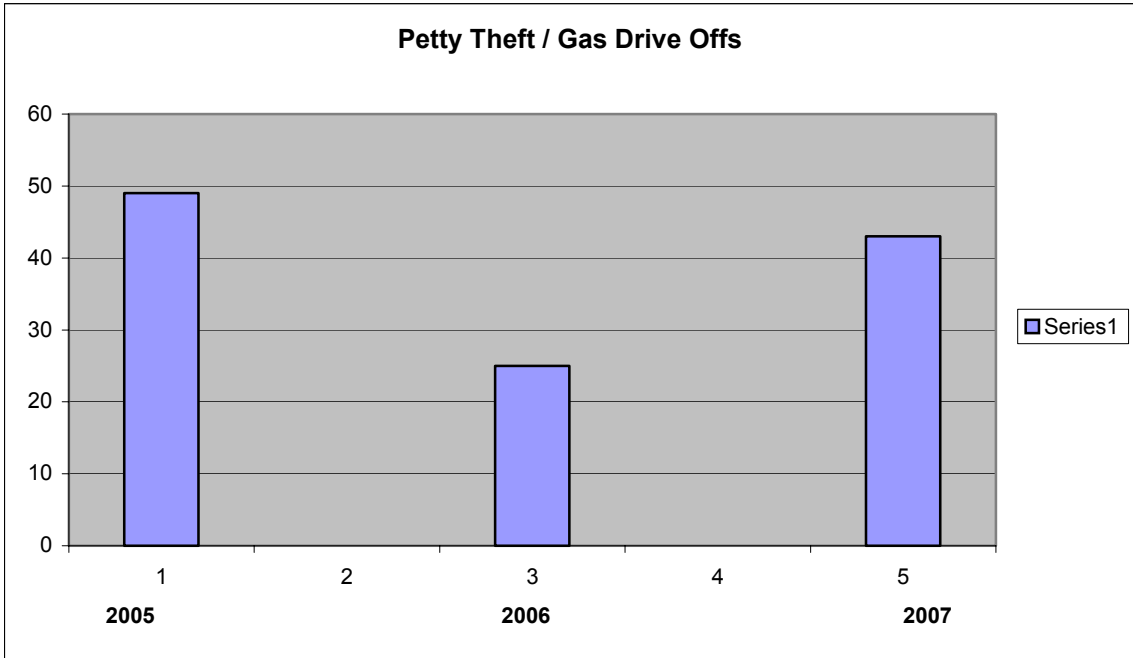
There was slight de-crease in 2007 from 2006



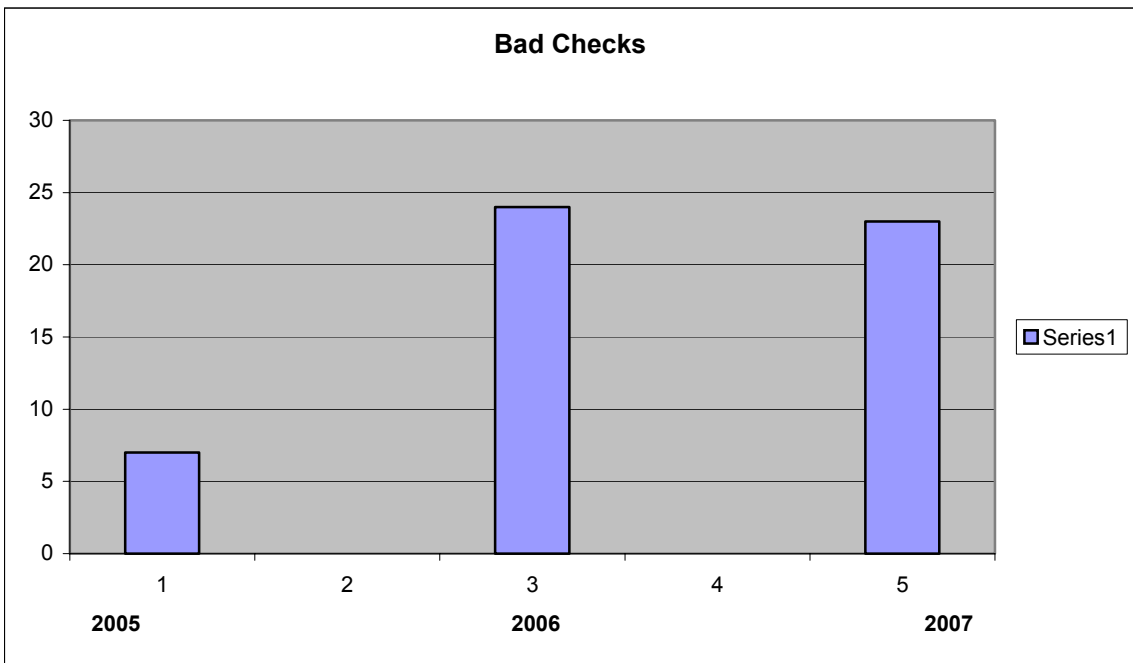
There was an in-crease in assaults in 2007



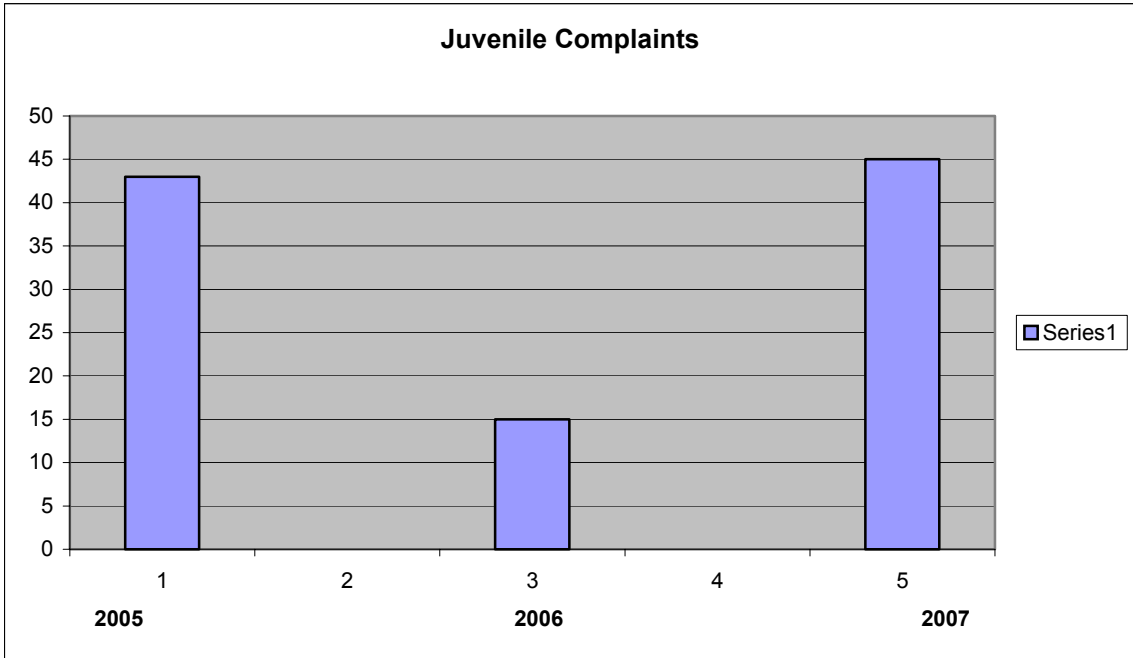
There was a de-crease in burglary and breaking and entering in 2007. This was due to the department's proactive patrols in problem areas.



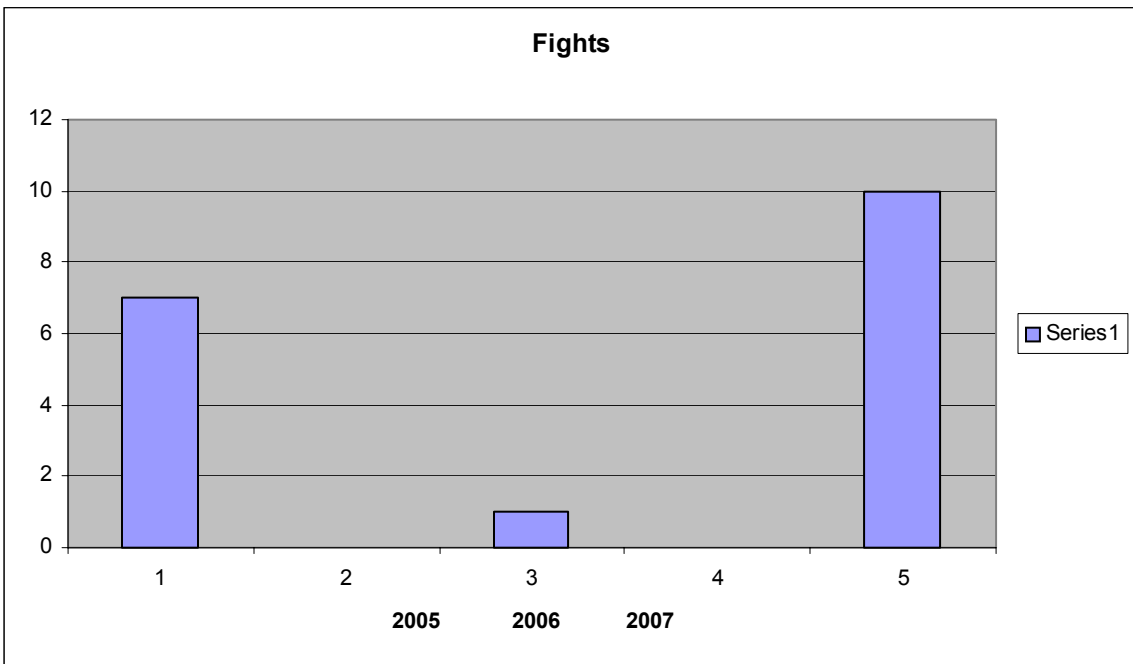
This section is up significantly from 2006



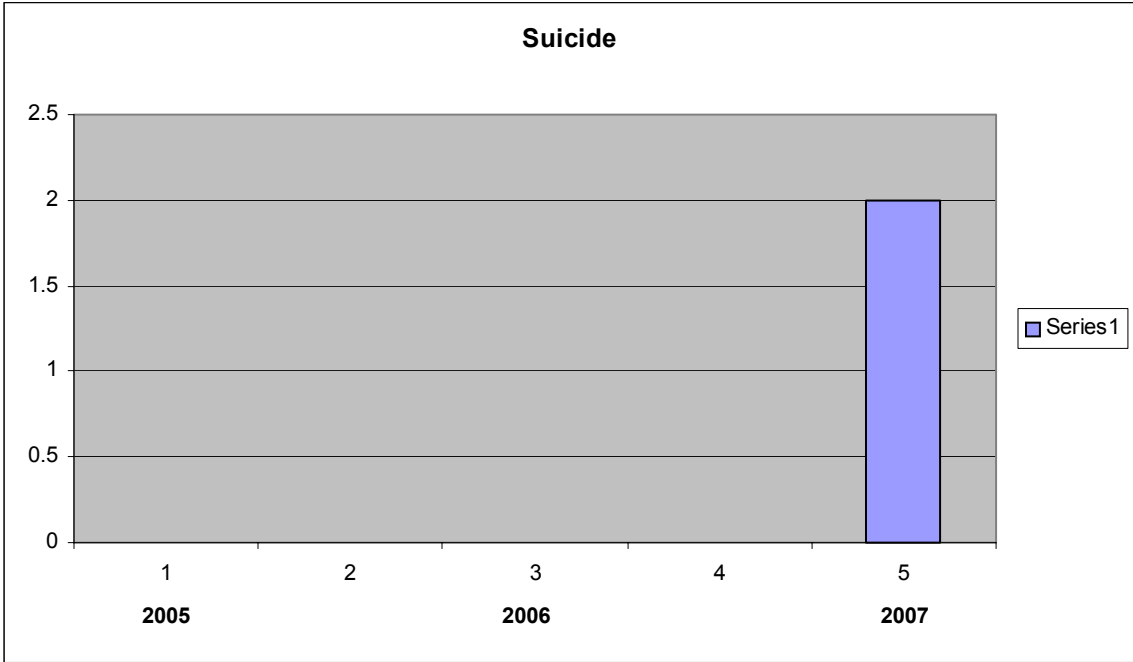
This area stayed even from 2006 to 2007.



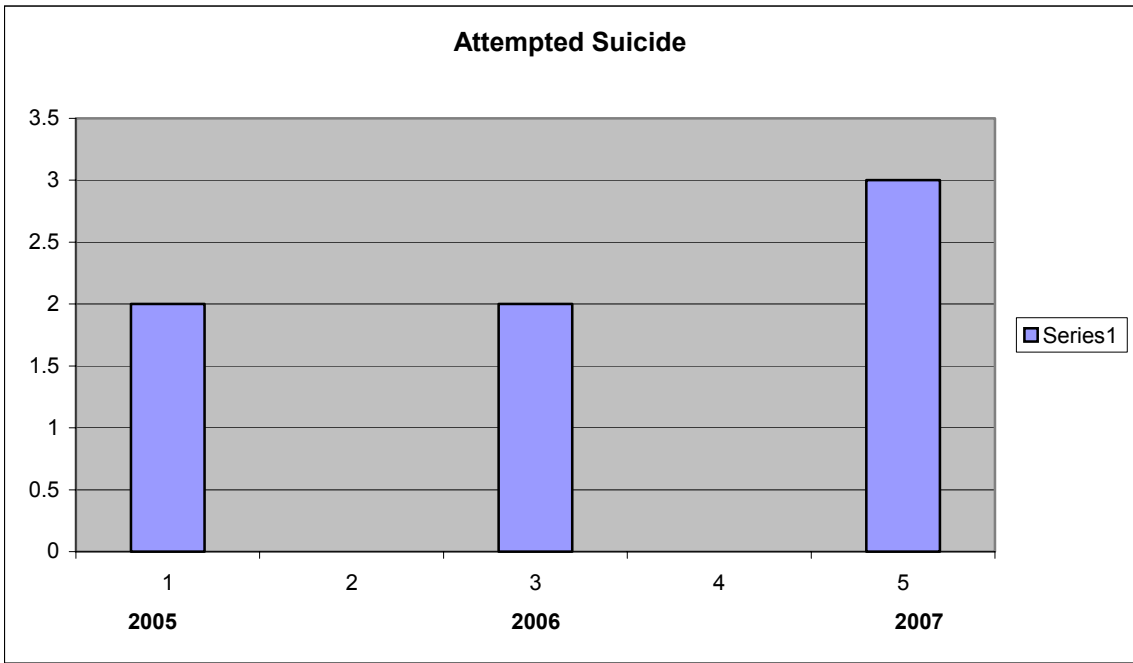
There is a significant in-crease in this area due to the number of Juvenile crimes going up statewide. There has been no significant reasoning for this jump statewide.



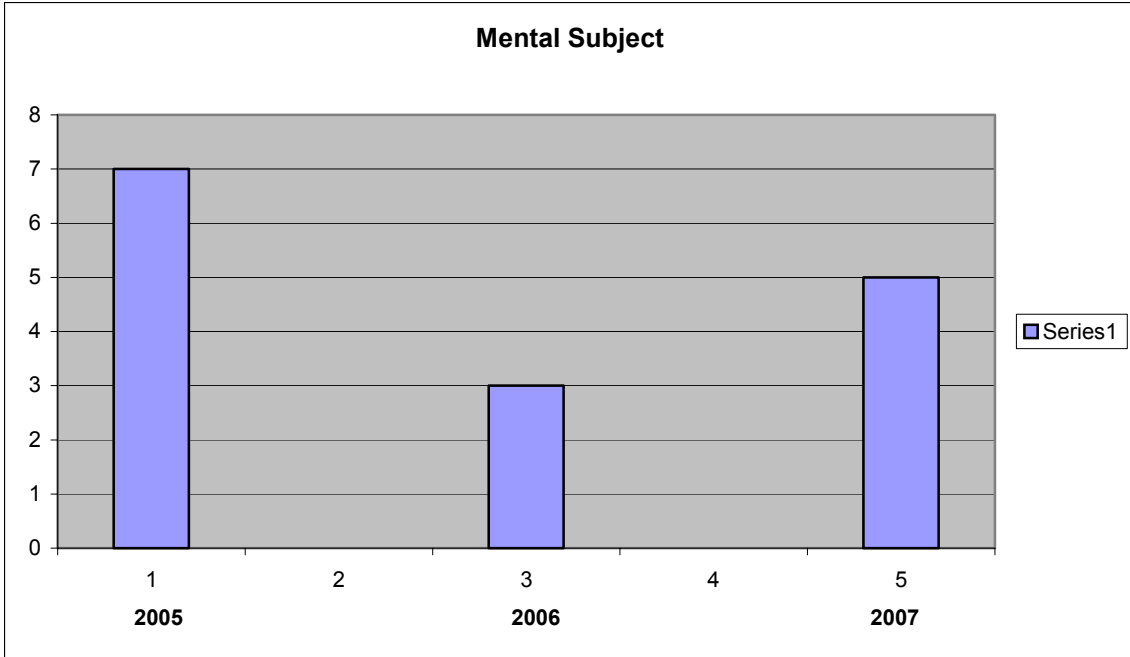
There is a marked in-crease in this area from 2006 and 2005.



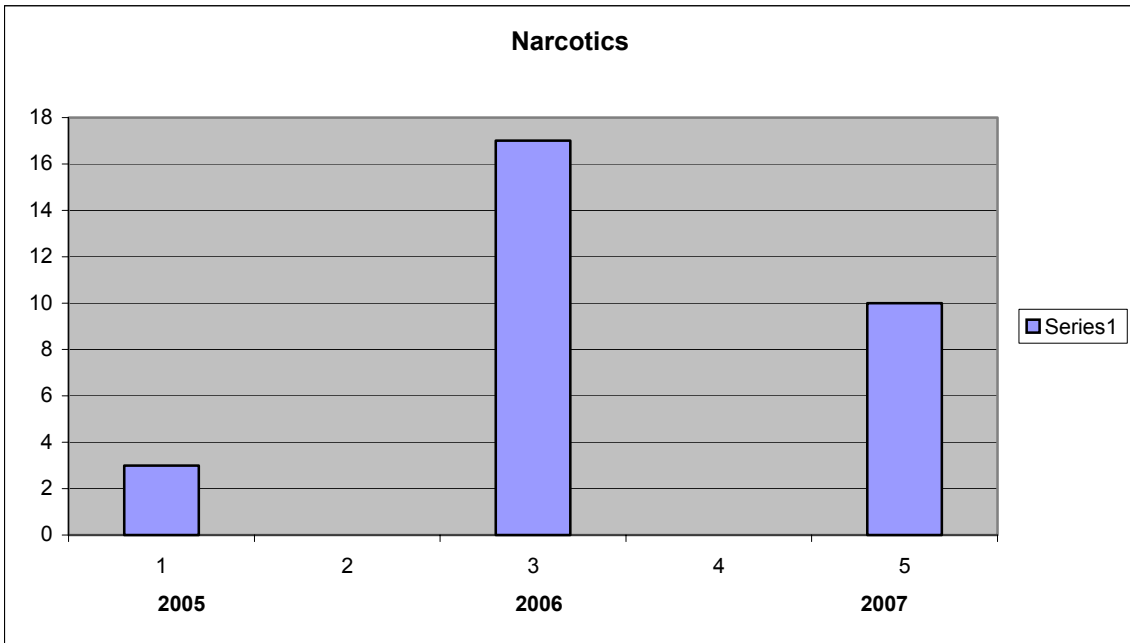
There were no suicides in 2005 and 2006. This year was the first year for two in the year.



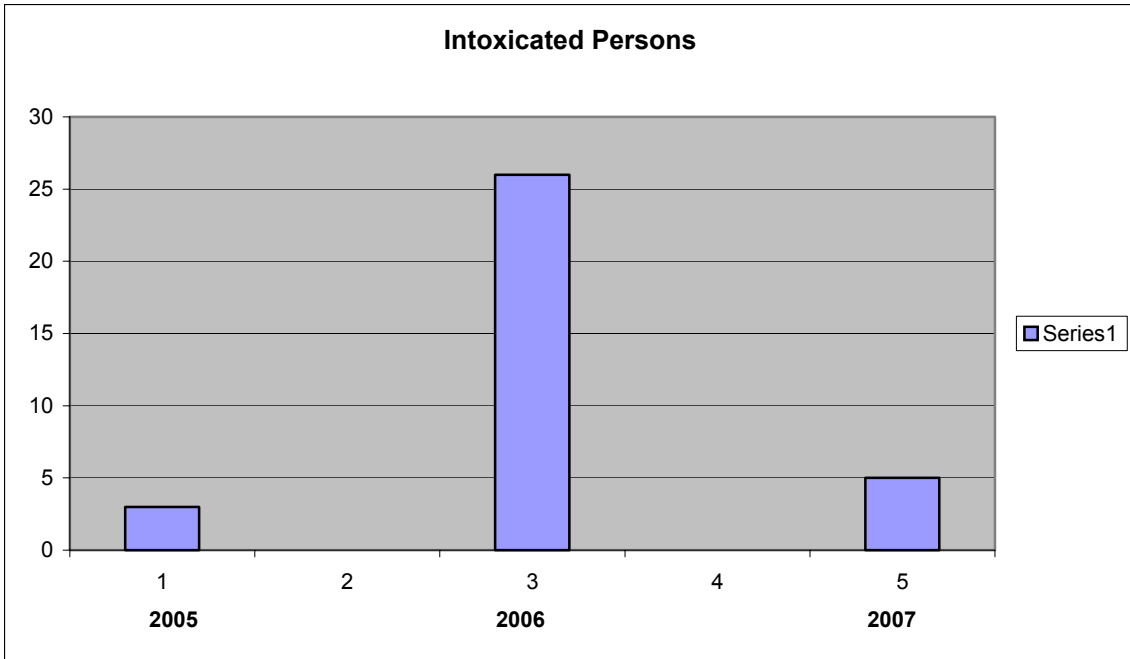
This area has remained steady for the last three years.



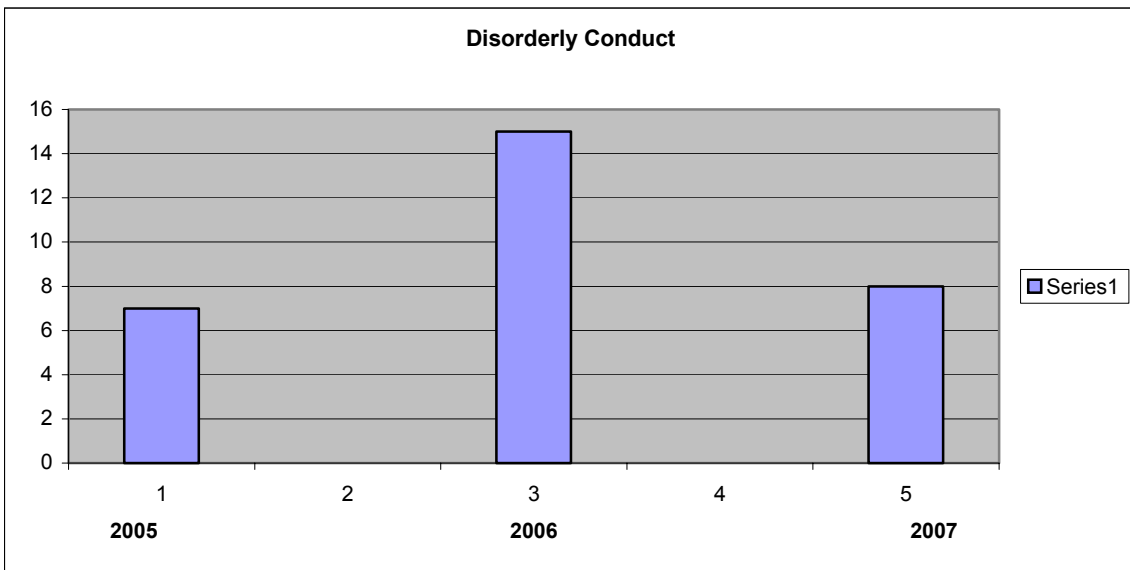
This area has remained close to slight in-crease over the last three years.



This area had a large in-crease in 2006, but a decline in 2007.



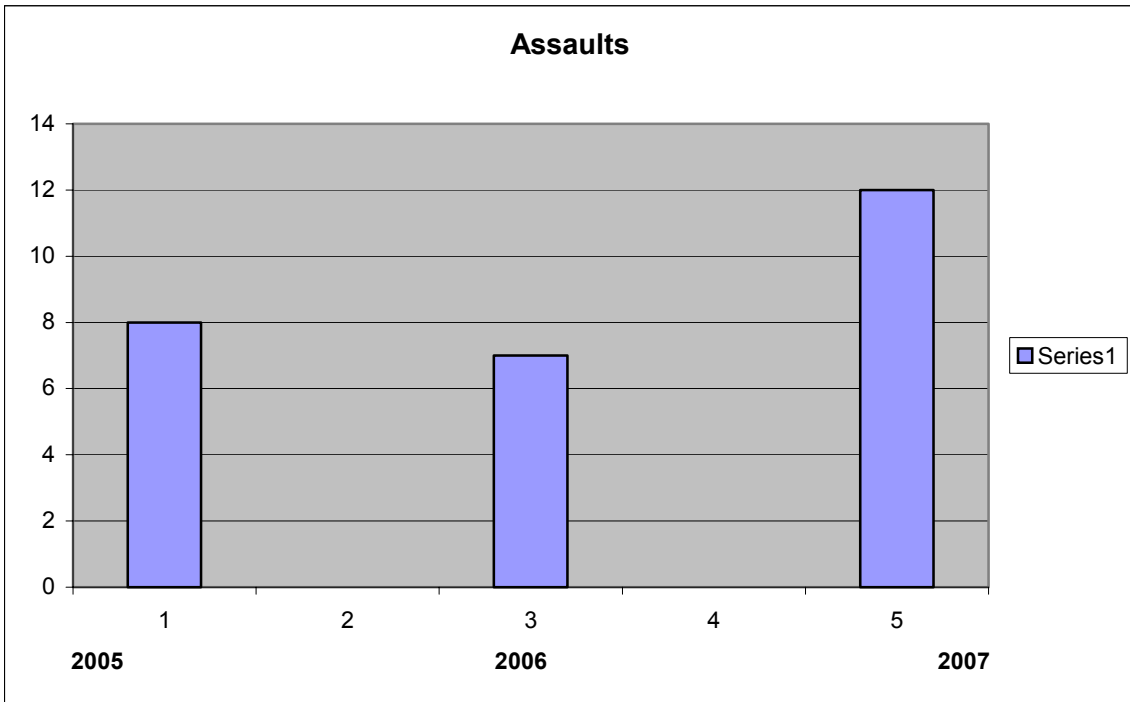
There is a significant de-crease in 2007 from 2006. This is due to more visibility and pro-active patrols in the plat areas.



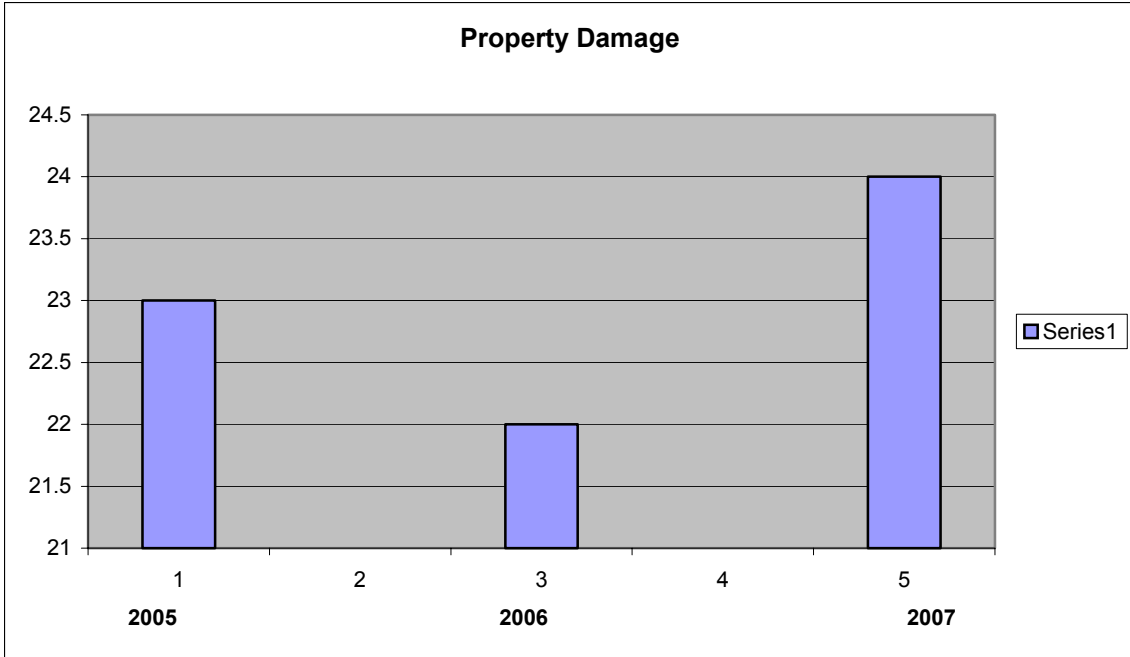
There is a slight decrease but this area usually remains steady during the reporting period.



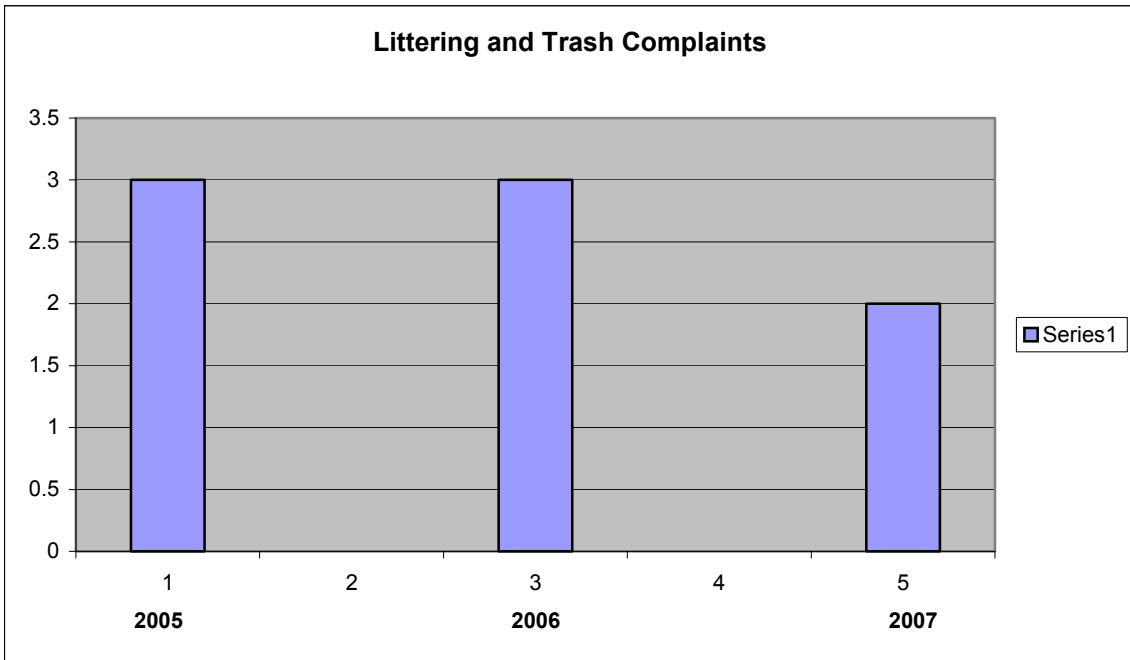
This area had a slight increase, but is still down from the 2005 levels.



There has been a steady increase in this area, and we do not see the trend falling off.

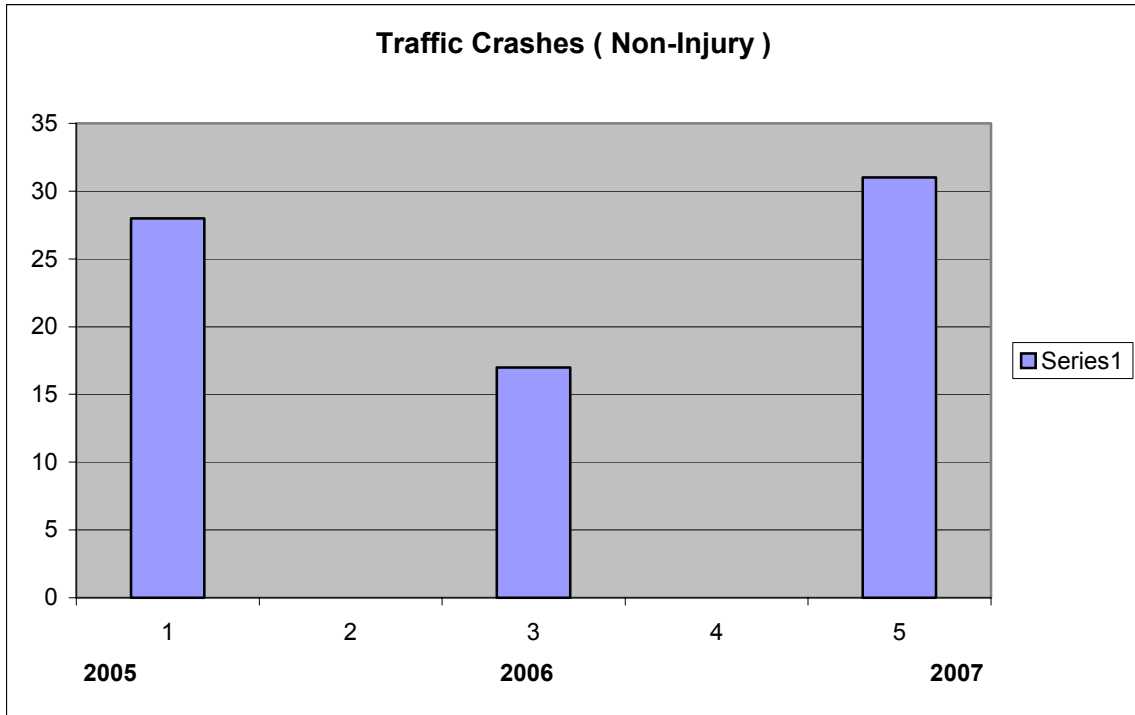


This area has stayed steady over the last three years.

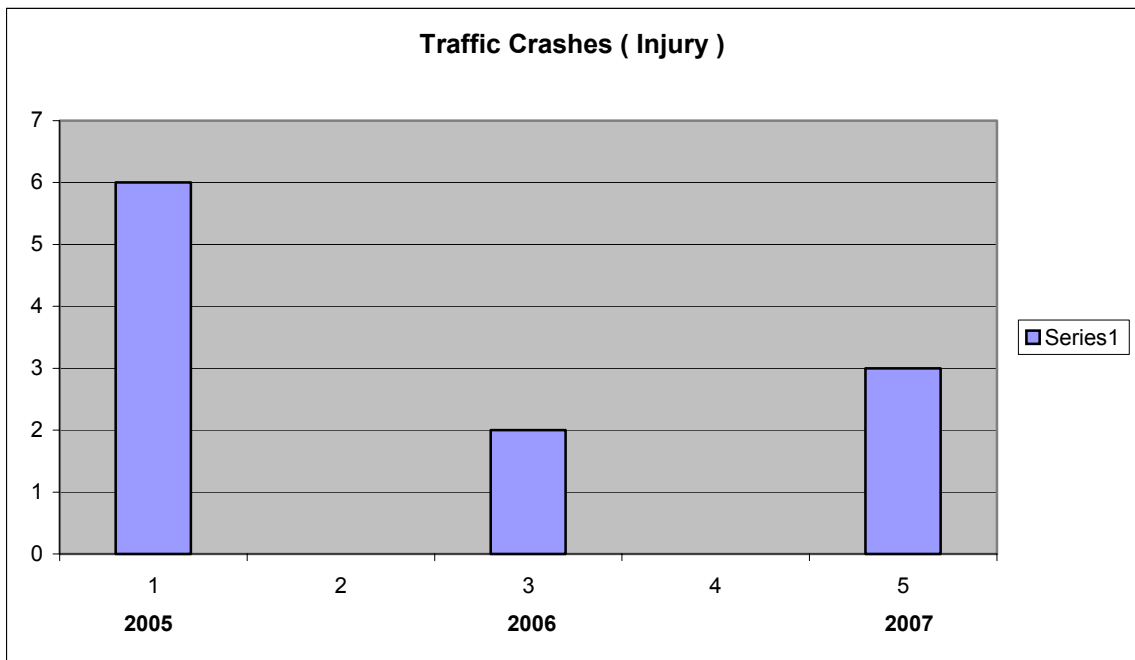


This area has remained steady for the last three-year reporting period.

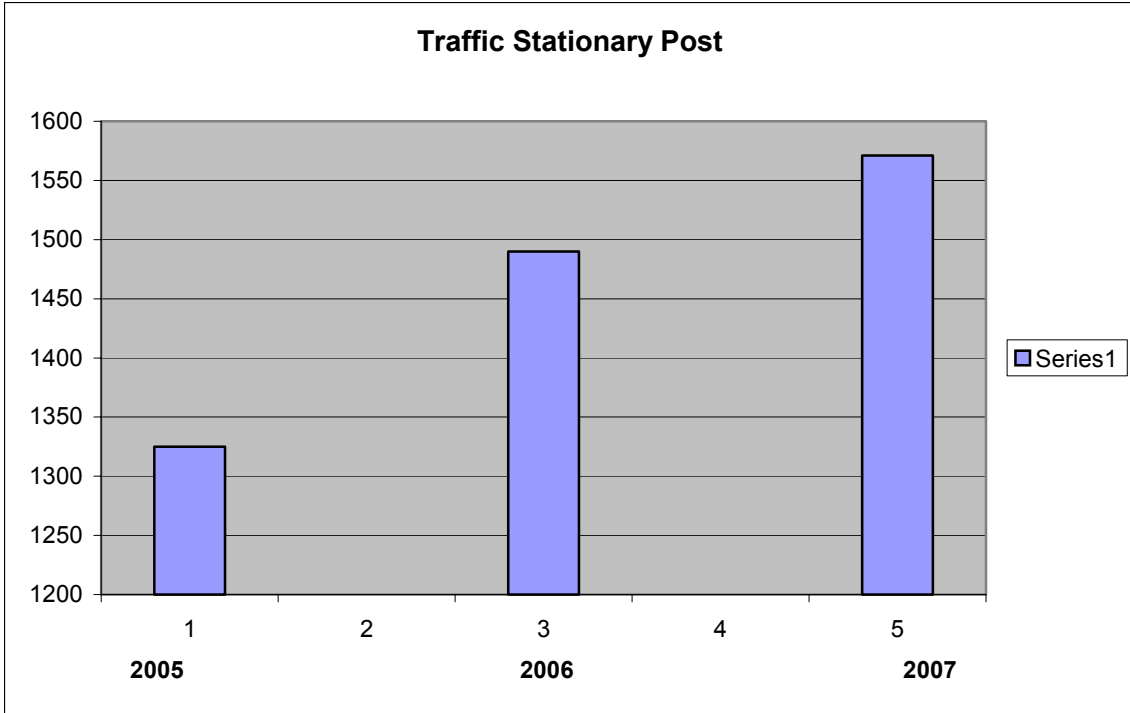
## Traffic Related Crimes & Statistics



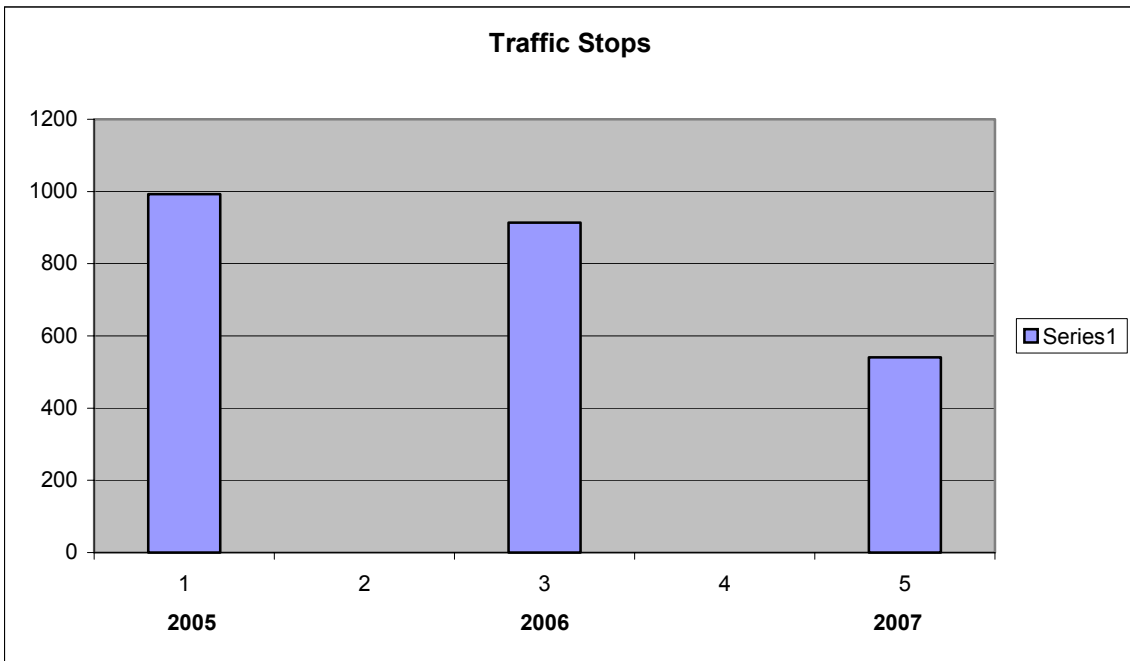
There was a significant increase from 2005 and 2006 in this area.



This area has remained steady over the last three years.



There was a large in-crease in traffic post due to Traffic Blitz's, reduction in speed and accidents.



There was a de-crease in traffic stops due to the visibility, and motorist slowing down.

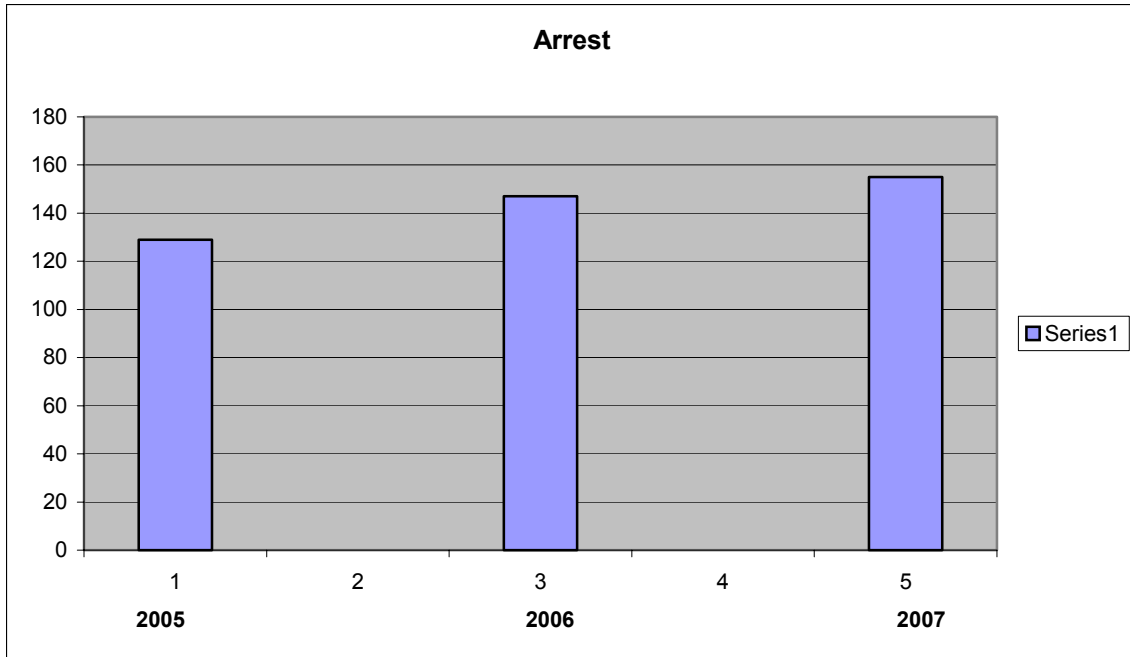
In 2007 there was 128 citations issued, for 171 offenses. There were 20 Driving Under Suspensions, and 17 Operating a Motor Vehicle while Impaired.

The de-crease in citations written was due to the high visibility of the road patrols maintaining the stationary traffic post. By being more visible to the motorist, this causes a significant de-crease in speed and other moving violations.

The department took part in all of the Traffic blitz's for this year. There was no funding available from the State again this year for overtime. All activity was done on the normal shifts with no overtime cost to the Village.

Assistant Chief Timson took part in, and was trained to do DUI Check-points. He participated in three checkpoints with the Clay Township Police Department (Montgomery County). Assistant Chief Timson was trained on all aspects of the checkpoint, and how to properly due all required notifications and reporting. The Police Department will hopefully do three checkpoints in 2008.

Assistant Chief Timson is also a member of the Miami Valley AAA Safe Street Program, and will be attending monthly meeting starting in 2008.



There was an increase in arrest this year, and this figure does not show signed charges that were filed in the prosecutor. This number will be reflected in 2008. There was a total of 19 Juvenile's that were arrest, and are part of the total count. There were 73 males arrest, with 26 females arrested for the year.

In 2008 due to the new reporting requirements from the state. The arrest total will also contain any charges that a filed with the courts, or any signed charges that are processed and approved by the Prosecutor's Office.

The increase in the cost of fuel was driven by the price increase at the pumps. While this was a concern, due to price fluctuation, it did not cause a budgetary concern for the Police Department. When the gas price did jump, we instituted cost saving measures in order to save fuel, but that had no reflection on our quality of service to the citizens.

## Community Oriented Policing

The Police Department does both Community Oriented Policing and Problem Oriented Policing. The difference is very simple. When we see a problem area after reviewing crime stats for the month. That area is marked as a saturated patrol. The increase police presence and visibility works to deter crime, and increase public bonds with the police department.

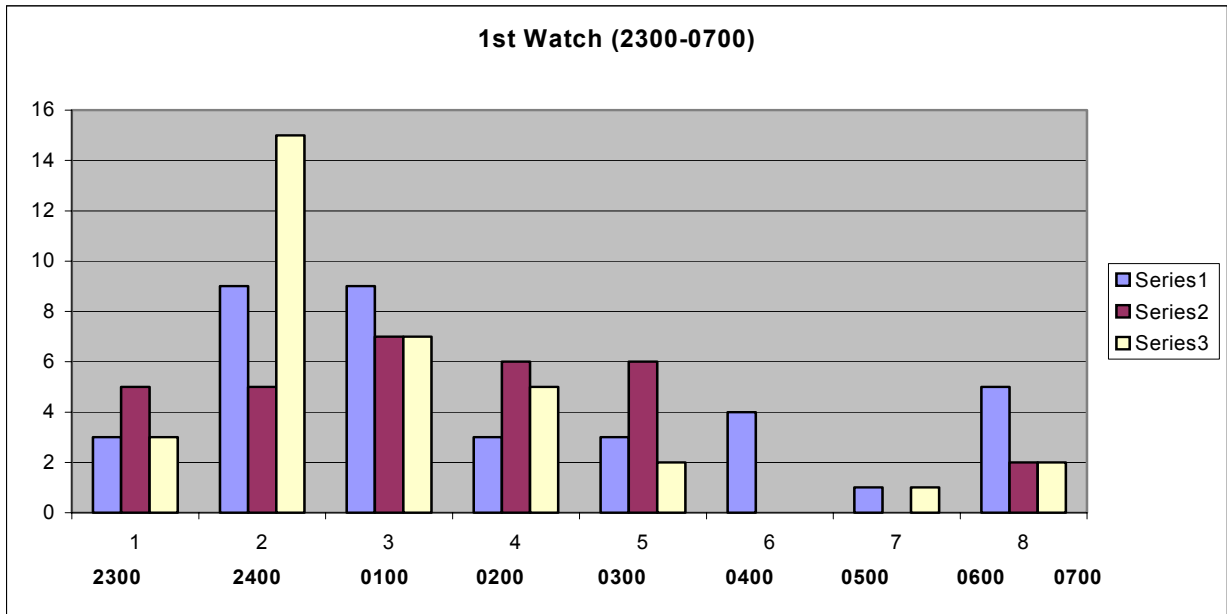
**COPS ENTRIES                    1591**

This includes going into businesses and making a presence to the owners and their employees. This also gives us as a police department an opportunity to interact with the public.

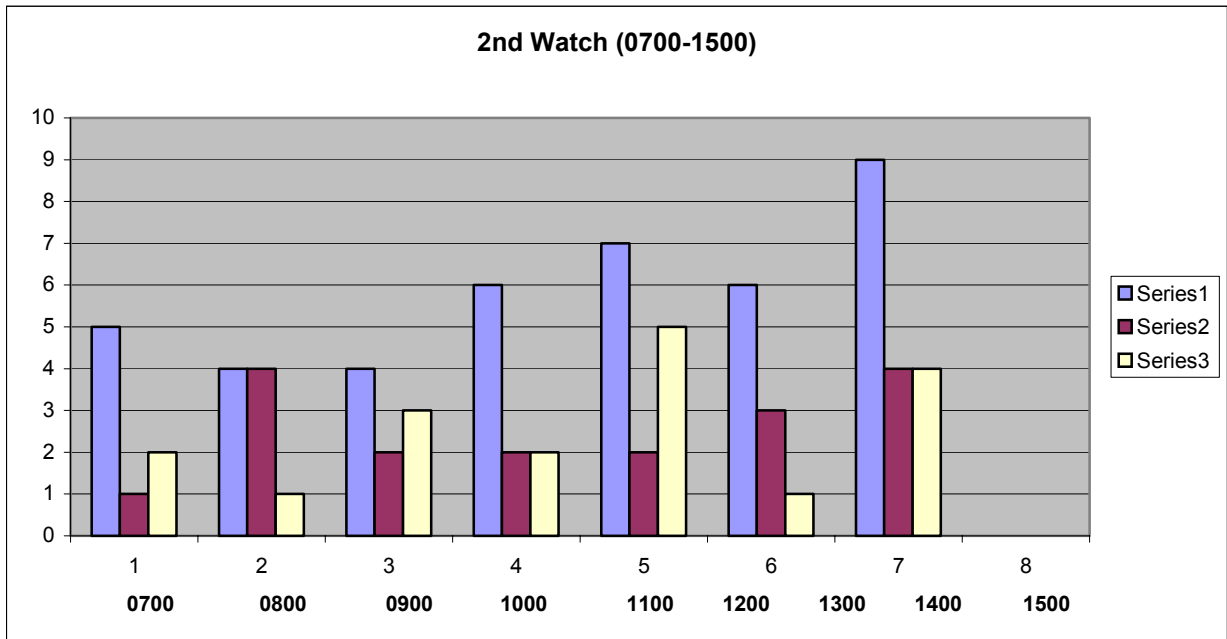
**FOOT PATROLS                    651**

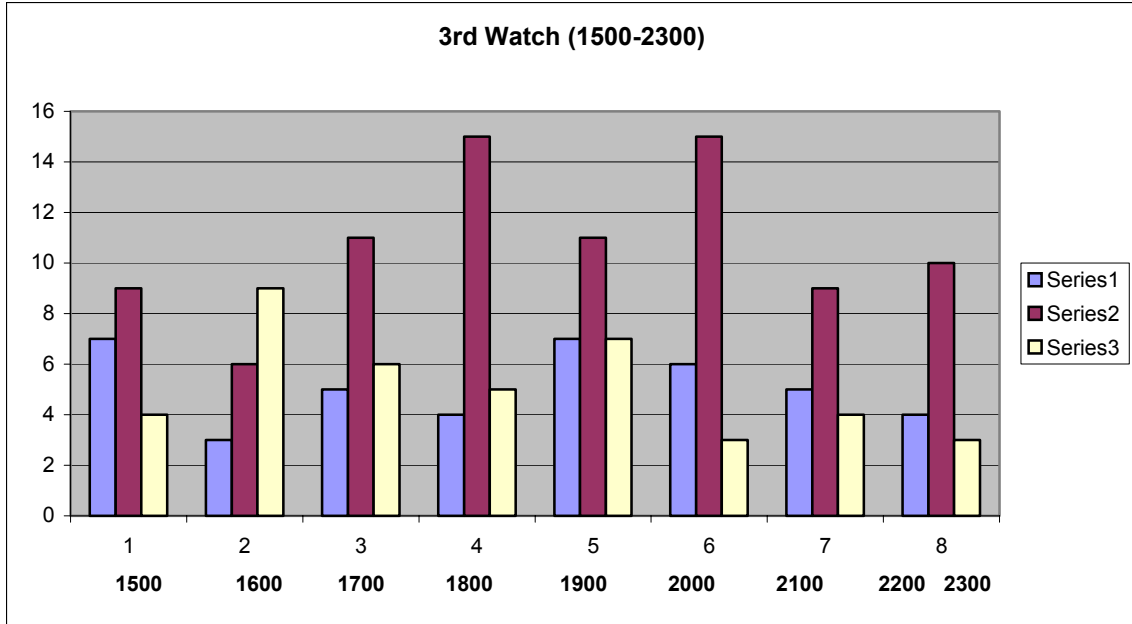
## Crime Statistic by Hour of the Day & Shift



Series 1 is 2005, Series 2 is 2006 and Series 3 is 2007.

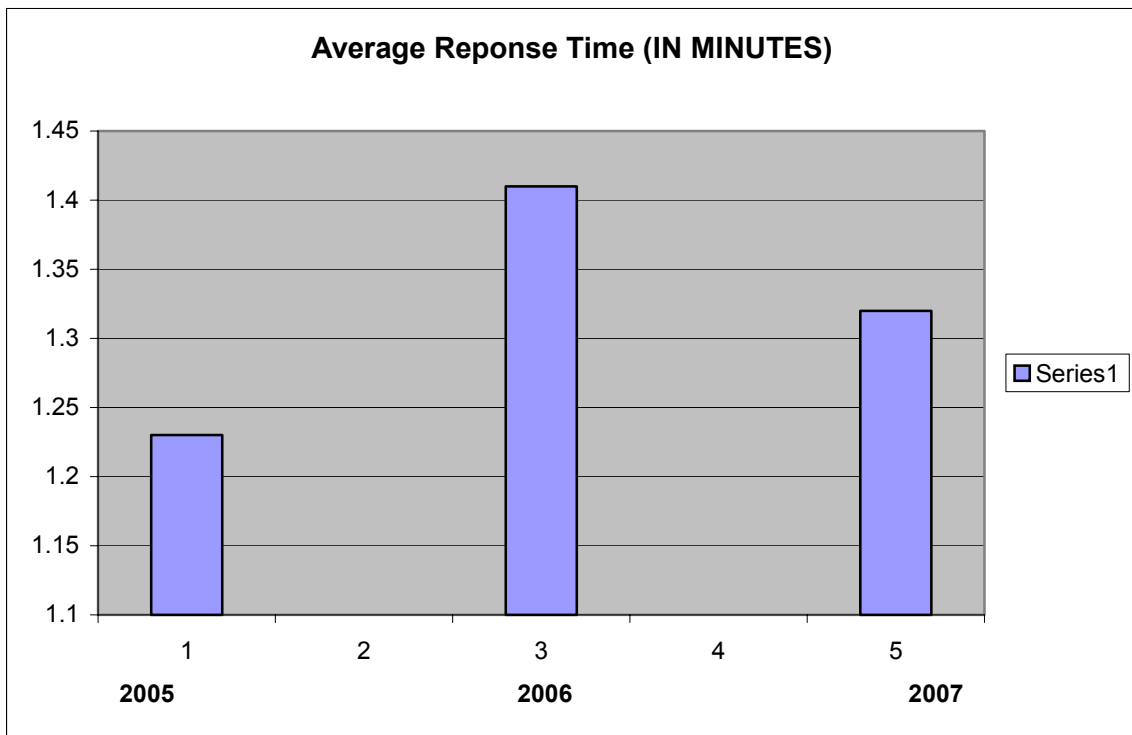


Series 1 is 2005, Series 2 is 2006 and Series 3 is 2007.

This is the response time from time call received to arrival on scene. In 2007 we dropped from 1.41 minutes in 2006 to 1.32 minutes.

## Training

The West Alexandria Police Department is proud of our Officers and Command Staff for their excellence in training. These are some highlights of the training the Command staff and Officers have received.

All Officers' took and passed the Mandatory Ohio Peace Officer Training to remain certified in the State of Ohio.

All Officers' re-qualified with both pistol and rifle. Some officers' are also certified on AR-15.

Assistant Chief Timson and Detective Swain, at their own expense, traveled to Memphis, Tennessee to receive specialized training in Close Quarters and Tactical Pistol, ground fighting, stick fighting, knife fighting, Terrorism Update.

Officer McGinnis travel to Cincinnati to take free training in Missing /Abducted Child and Adults given by the Ohio Missing Person Task Force and the FBI.

Officer La Force and Clevenger went to Hamilton, Ohio for free training in Interdiction and other related topics as presented by the US Department of Justice.

Each officer including the Command staff took part in at least 15 hours of training offered by the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy on-line training.

Chief Webb attends the monthly Montgomery County Intel meeting.

The department held three in-service training this year for all officers.

The officers' of this department train very hard each year to provide the best quality service to our citizens.
